MEET US IN DUNLAP FOR THE 4TH!

With Dunlap's annual 4th of July parade and park celebration quickly approaching, the 4th of July Committee has been focused on organizing and otherwise ensuring the success of the event!

This event requires an immense amount of volunteers to pull it off! Over 50 volunteers will be stationed at the ticket stand and various inflatables thorughout the duration of the event, as well as heading up the



The principal is protected, invested and grows.


3. GRANT

THE "BAD DOG" IS BACK UP ON HIGHWAY 30

For years, a very large depiction of a little girl holding a shredded teddy bear, pouting next to a dalmatian, has stood next to Highway 30 south of Dunlap. Over time, this huge piece of roadside art became a recognizable landmark and brought a "welcome home" feeling to many.

More recently, due to its deteriorating state, the piece had to be taken down. Mike "Space" Schwery initiated a campaign to fundraise and bring a new version of the same art installation back to the area.

Jill Schaben, DCDC, and Schwery did a quick internet search and were successful in finding the original artist, John Cerney. John emailed back pretty quickly and was very interested in the project.

By the end of May, "Space" had raised the money, and the artist reinstalled the project on the north side of Dunlap, along Hwy 30. Cerney repainted it in California and drove for three days to bring it back to life.





- History of the Installation -

When we reached out to John more recently, on March 18, 2025, here is what he said:

"People in Dunlap may have forgotten, but there was actually another mural on that same spot a few years prior to the 'Crying Little Girl' being placed there. In 1997, I persuaded my friend Richard Hein to get his dad to let me place a mural on his corn field. I wanted to display my cutout paintings in other places besides California. The original mural was of a domestic scene — a husband hanging a painting while his wife directs him, plus the family dog. I told Gerry that I would only place the mural there for a year or two, and then haul it back to California. I actually sold it to a frame shop in my hometown of Salinas, CA. Gerry was sad about the mural leaving, as it was becoming a landmark in the area. I thought, what the heck...I would leave the dog, but paint something else in the same spot where the husband was. I came up with the crying little girl, who is upset because the family dog has ripped her teddy bear to shreds. Whether it made sense or not, it just became a part of the landscape."

"So, it was actually in 1999 when I came out to haul back the original mural and install the crying little girl. The Dalmatian was really too small in relation to the little girl, so if I were to paint another one, I would correct that, and probably have him/her hanging his head in shame!"

MORE IMPROVEMENTS (AND MORE PICKLEBALL) AT CITY PARK AND POOL

The Dunlap Grants Committee saw a need to enhance the Dunlap Community Swimming Pool with two new shade structures. "We have an amazing swimming pool," said Jill Schaben, Executive Director of DCDC, "but there is no shade offered. Many parents end up sitting right against the bathhouse trying to find shade!"

The new shade structures offer protection and relief from the sun's harmful UV rays! Pool-goers are already taking full advantage of the shade offered! "I was at the pool a few times very recently, and many people were using and complimenting the new structures!"

The shades were purchased with funding from the Dean J. King Grant and they were installed by the City of Dunlap workers, Tony Warnock, Matt Koski and Ryan Donscheski. Greg Brasel loaned a skidloader auger and a bucket fabricated to help pour cement.

The City workers also assembled and installed two new benches at the basketball court and six new benches inside the pool bathhouse. These benches were purchased with funding from the Harrison County Community Foundation!

A basketball backboard was accidentally broken recently, and the City of Dunlap purchased and replaced it.

Future plans for the park include extending the chain link fence on the north side of the court taller, installing light posts to the basketball court and adding a second, independent pickelball court. "Greg Brasel's bid was accepted for pouring the concrete for the new pickleball court. We hope to have it poured very soon," said Schaben. "We also want to surface it to match the basketball court, but that will be a phase two project because we need to find more funding."

Trees are crucial for both the environment and human well-being, playing vital roles in cleaning air and water and supporting human health and communities.



The newly elected President has hit the ground running, navigating water main issues, encouraging the Center to convert one restroom to make it handicapped-accessible, and address issues with the floor sloping.

The Center has been bustling with fun seasonal parties. With the help of Sponsor, Angels Home Health Care Rep. McKenna Murphy, they have hosted an Easter Party, Mother's Day Tea Party, and Father's Day Party. Dunlap Specialty Care Activities Director, Jackson Thomsen, was also on hand to assist with some of the fun and festivities.

With Dunlap's main street under reconstruction, visitors to the Senior Center are currently using the alley-side entrance. Tony and Connie Casperson power-washed the exterior walls on the backside of the building and filled cracks and crevices in the cinder blocks. Jim and Patty Mumm repaired gutters and vents in the eaves of the building.

A mural was painted with paint that was recycled from previous murals and sample paint donated by Dunlap Lumber and Home Supply.

A stunning garden that was initiated by Lois Anderson already exists near the rear-side of the building, and it has been further enhanced with donated flowers and stepping stones.

Tony Casperson fabricated a metal ramp and rail to allow for safer entry on the alley-side entrance, and Cogdill Farm Supply moved a concrete bench so people could sit as they wait to be picked up.

A dry erase board was ordered and installed by Patty Mumm so that the Senior Center could track and publish all the individuals who donate their time, talents and money to the Center each month. The facility continues to welcome more and more visitors at their monthly events, bi-weekly coffee times, and daily meals. All are welcome and encouraged to visit the Dunlap Senior Center and see what it has to offer.

BENCHES ARE RELOCATED IN PREP FOR MAIN STREET RECONSTRUCTION





With the help of Ethan Sandvold, Austin Schaben, and Kyle Wadsworth, of the Dunlap Livestock Auction, the community was able to remove crumbling benches and picnic tables at Dunlap's Peoples' Park and replace them with ones in good shape, relocated from Main Street.

Meanwhile, Renea Anderson of the Harrison County Development Corporation, assisted multiple communities within Harrison County simultaneously by helping us relocate planters and trash receptacles from Dunlap's main street to other towns within in the county.

"With a plan to update all of our main street furnishings with black metal ones, we had unsponsored stone planters and trash cans that we did not need anymore," said Jill Schaben.

"Renea reached out with a great idea, to sell our items to other towns for a small cost. This kept the furnishings out of the landfill, benefitted the small towns that purchased them, and gave Dunlap a little money to put towards park improvements.

Stay tuned as the construction project advances. We can't wait to see how fresh Main Street looks with new sidewalks, light posts, and new black furnishings."


BV YOUTH ORG KNOCKS IT OUT OF THE PARK




