

A neighboring town has a very conscientious editor. He refused the offer of an advertisement this week from M. Barrett & Sons because "it would not be 'a fair shake' for me to run such prices in opposition to my supporters here at home." We admire this editor's loyalty and believe firmly that he is flush.

THE LEDDEN FAMILY

In the fall of 1867 William and Abigail Ledden came from Cedar Rapids, where he had been employed by the C. & N. W. Railroad. They settled in this little village of Dunlap, which had just a few houses scattered here and there. The Page family had built a home, and insisted on the Leddens staying there with them. Mr. Ledden then began to build a house for his family. There were ten children sent to bless this home, two sons dying in infancy, seven girls and a boy left to continue their lives in Dunlap. Nell and Jennie were dressmakers. Tim and Mary worked for M. Barrett & Sons, later buying the store, which they called Ledden and Ledden, and operating it until 1932. Kathryn, Margaret Ann and Elizabeth took their places in the educational field. Kathryn and Elizabeth Dwyer have a total of 70 years service in the Dunlap Public School.

They continued living in their home (now owned by Oscar Piper) until 1916, when they bought one from Father Hansen, located where the first Catholic School

stood. This is still the Dwyer home.

In those early days in Dunlap, when the Indians were living in the Grove, they would come to the homes and take a batch of fresh bread and whatever else was in sight. Also, a Fourth of July Celebration was not complete without roasting an ox for a lunch (free to all) that took place where the golf course is located today.

The Leddens spent most of their lives in Dunlap, but are all deceased except Mrs. Dwyer. Although she retired in 1965, she has been called back to serve on the faculty to teach some special classes. She has taught three generations in the same family in at least one case, and many sets of

parents and their children.

Dunlap, Soldier Banks Merge, Become 'Community Bank'

By Doris Bingham

"You can continue using the checks you've got as long as they last," said Jay Randall, executive vice president of the newly merged Community Bank. "That seems to be the first concern people have."

Dunlap Savings Bank merged with Soldier Valley Savings Bank commencing Jan. 1 in a move which, Randall says, will benefit both communities and create increased efficiency within both banks.

Jay, who is chief executive officer and executive vice president of the bank, and his father. Dick Randall, who is president of the bank, discussed the merger last week in the Dunlap office.

The joint bank will have assets of \$32,100,000 combining that of the Dunlap bank at \$25,700,000 and the Soldier bank at \$6,400,000.


The process started in September of 1991 when the board of the Dunlap bank was approached by officers of the Soldier bank.

"In a community as small as Soldier." Dick explained, "it's hard to raise the deposits needed for the increased loan demand as farms get bigger and farm loans get larger."

The previous limit for a loan from the Soldier bank was \$80,000 without using a "correspondent" bank. Dunlap's limit is \$400,000. The merger allows Soldier customers the same limit as Dunlap customers.

Interest rates, which had been lower in Soldier, and loan rates, which had been higher, can also be comparable, although loan rates are handled on an individual basis depending on the particular circumstance and credit record.

Furthermore, both banks will be equally able to handle specialized loans.

such as student loans, FmHA programs, SBA loans, which require special training by at least one employee in the bank.

The "ready-reserve" account service will now be available to customers in both banks. That is, the customer can sign up to have the bank draw on a passbook savings account in case of an overdraft The cost of a transfer of funds is only \$1 whereas the cost of an overdraft is \$6.

There will be no visible change for the Dunlap community except the name, said Jay, but there will be greater efficiency in both banks in addition to the increased deposit base

The Dunlap bank has been operated by a board made up of seven members There will be one member added to the board who will be named from Soldier in addition, the managing officer at the Soldier bank, who is Bob Halverson, will be sitting in at all board meetings

The only significant change the Dunlap community will see is in the name "Community Bank" has been chosen to eliminate identifying the bank specifically with either community and to avoid the term "Savings." which has sometimes confused customers

Those who are not familiar with the banks have assumed, since the term "Savings" was in the name, that they are Savings and Loan facilities when in fact both banks are commercial banks. This has become a negative connotation because of the recent Savings and Loan scandals.

Eliminating the word "Savings" can help avoid that confusion. Dick said

The new sign won't be going up in Dunlap until spring The sign will

probably contain the new logo. The new sign in Soldier will replace the former sign with the name on the building itself

The banks will share the same identification number Therefore checks from "Dunlap Savings Bank" can be used indefinitely The Soldier bank had a different 11D number and the Soldier checks with the old number can be used for a limit of one year

The merging process has taken longer than was initially anticipated, said Dick, because a few months ago the decision was made to wait till the new year started to simplify bookkeeping changes



Community Bank's 75 year history retraced

Community Bank, which is marking its 75th anniversary this year, provided this bank history at the request of the Dunlap Reporter.

The first bank in Dunlap, the "Dunlap Bank," was established in 1871 and became the Dunlap State Bank.

At the turn of the twentieth century there were three banks in Dunlap. The Dunlap State Bank was located on the southwest corner of the Highway 30/37 intersection. The First National Bank was located on the southeast corner of the Highway 30/37 intersection. And the Citizens State Bank was located in the building at 617 Iowa Ave.

Dunlap State Bank's doors were closed in September of 1925. The closing reflected a condition that was sweeping the Midwest during the 20s as agricultural prices were depressed long before the stock market crash of 1929. In 1924, Iowa had 1,600 banks. By 1934, there were 600. The closing was due to the inability of the bank to

collect on outstanding loans and withdrawal of deposits with no new deposits. The bank did not open its doors for five months and then only after consolidation.

On Feb. 24, 1926, the Dunlap State Bank consolidated with the First National Bank as the Dunlap Savings Bank. The new bank took over \$230,000 of deposits in the First National Bank and assumed 50 percent of the assets of the old Dunlap State Bank and issued certificates of deposit to all former depositors for that amount. The remaining assets of the old Dunlap State Bank were liquidated. Officers of the new bank were M C Daly, President; H W Millard, Vice President, H. W. Van Horn, Cashier; Alta Howe, Glen Millard, Frank McCann and Helen Barrett

The third bank, Citizens State Bank, was opened on April 1, 1894, by Michael Barrett. His son, Jim, served as its president for many years. It merged with the Dunlap Savings Bank on May 2, 1929. At the time, it was reported,

0:

"The combination gives Dunlap one of the strongest financial institutions in this part of the state." However, the depression years were just beginning.

In March of 1933, all banks across the country were forced to declare a holiday. The bank, with many others, operated under Senate File 111 until June of 1934. On June 24, 1934, after release from Senate File 111, Dunlap Savings Bank listed total resources of \$188,651.08.

The Dunlap Savings Bank's stock was held by many shareholders and the bank was operated by Glen Millard until January 1961 when Richard Randall was hired.

The Dunlap Savings Bank remained in its location on the southeast corner of the intersection of Highway 30/37 until July of 1980. During the previous year, a new facility was constructed on the northeast corner of the intersection of Highway 30/37.

In 1981 the Randall family organized the Dunlap Iowa Holding Co. and acquired 93.8% of the stock of the Dunlap Savings Bank

The bank operated under the name of Dunlap Savings Bank until January 1, 1993 when the name was changed to Community Bank, because of the merger of Dunlap Savings Bank and Soldier Valley Savings Bank of Soldier, Iowa. Community Bank is a wholly owned subsidiary of Soldier Valley Financial Services, Inc., which is wholly owned by Dunlap Iowa Holding Co.
